Comprehension Questions to Check for Understanding

Literal

1. Where was the Grey House situated?

(on a steep hill, in the middle of terrace houses, facing out across the harbour to the sea)

Inferential

1. Why was Rufus excitedly darting through everyone's legs?

(because there was so much going on around him – smells, sounds and movement – and he wanted to be a part of it)

2. Why was the strangeness in the breeze a beckoning smell?

(The smell of the sea was new and exciting.)

Applied Knowledge

1. Why was the yacht under full sail?

(Both sails were up because the yacht had come a long distance across the sea to this harbour.)

2. Why was Great Uncle Merry so tense when he saw the yacht gliding into the bay?

(He must have known the reason why it was coming and it was giving him cause for concern.)

3. Why did Jane think that Great Uncle Merry could never look frightened?

(Jane was in awe of Great Uncle Merry because he always seemed to be in control of everything.)

Vocabulary

1. Replace the verb 'entranced' in this sentence: Simon stood watching, entranced.

(engrossed / enthralled / mesmerised)

2. Replace the adjective 'intense' in this clause: he was frowning, fierce and intense.

(earnest / ardent / passionate)

Oral Analysis and Critique of the Text (for fiction) *(dictated by student)*

1. Analysis (how the text is constructed)

How did the author use language to engage the reader?

(Answers will vary, but may include: descriptive language, e.g. the tall graceful triangle of a yacht; like a craggy towering statue; the dramatic setting; short phrases used for effect, e.g. cautious, startled, alarmed.)

Describe some of the characteristics and text structures related to this text type – Narrative.

(Answers will vary, but may include: dialogue used to introduce the mysterious yacht; descriptions of characters and their actions build mystery, e.g. looking and listening with senses other than his eyes and ears.)

What are some of the ways the author has kept the reader interested in the story?

(Answers will vary, but may include: the reader learns of events as and when the main characters do, so there is a strong feeling of suspense.)

Why do you think the author wrote the story in this way?

(Answers will vary, but may include: by describing the events but not explaining them, the author is keeping the reader interested and wanting to read on.)

2. Critique (reflect and evaluate the text)

How effectively has the author revealed details about the characters?

(What does the author or other characters say about a particular character?)

Give your opinion about this text. *(student's personal response)*
