


What Can I Do?

Page 2 features a Nisga'a child in regalia dancing at the Nass River Valley Pow Wow. A pow wow is a celebration of Indigenous culture and arts. The photo on the cover, title page, and page 7 shows a young boy participating in the sack race at the Muskrat Jamboree in Inuvik, NWT. After a long arctic winter, people celebrate the spring thaw with music, games, and feasting at the Jamboree.
